

Buckinghamshire Council Charitable Collections Policy consultation

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Overview

We want to hear your views on our draft Charitable Collections Policy for Buckinghamshire Council.

As the Licensing Authority, we regulate:

- house to house collections collection of money or goods from someone's home for charity
- **street collections** collection of money or selling articles for charity in any street or public place (such as a shop doorway or car park)

There is no fee for a house to house collection licence or street collection permit, but you could be fined if you collect without a licence or permit.

Draft Buckinghamshire Council Charitable Collections Policy

The draft policy sets out:

- the legal requirements
- the application process
- our approach to preventing nuisance to residents and businesses in Buckinghamshire
- our approach to enforcing unlicensed activities

The draft policy aims to ensure that:

- the interests of public donors and beneficiaries are safeguarded
- collections are carried out to high standards by bona fide, authorised charitable organisations

- proceeds of the collection are properly accounted for
- a fair proportion of the proceeds are donated to registered charities
- unacceptable nuisance to the public is prevented
- unlicensed collections are prevented from taking place
- action is taken where there is evidence of unlicensed collection activity

The policy will cover the Buckinghamshire Council area. It will replace any charitable collections policies from the previous district councils.

Who the policy applies to

This policy is for anyone applying to carry out either a house to house or street collection. It provides information for anyone collecting and members of the public affected.

Licensing applications must be made:

- at least 28 days before collecting
- no more than 12 months before collecting

How the draft policy has been developed

The draft policy follows legislation, including the Model Regulations, and guidance from relevant organisations.

These include The National Association of Licensing Enforcement Officers, Chartered Institute of Fundraisers, and the Fundraising Regulator.

We will use your responses to develop the final Buckinghamshire Council Charitable Collections Policy.

The policy will then be presented to our Licensing Committee for approval and adoption in Summer 2023.

We will review the policy every 5 years.

Printed consultation survey

House to house collections

A licence is required to collect money or goods from someone's home for charity.

The purpose of regulating charitable collections is to protect residents, particularly the vulnerable, from being exploited and from fraudulent requests for donations.

There is currently no reference to collecting direct debit information in house to house collection regulations. Collecting direct debit information was not an option when the legislation came into force.

House to house collections can be carried out by commercial collectors on a charity's behalf. The percentage of collections given to charitable causes is not specified in law. We can determine whether to set a minimum amount.

It is recommended that licensing authorities avoid setting minimum amounts as the costs involved can vary substantially.

Rather than setting a minimum amount, we are proposing that the charity submits a declaration confirming they are satisfied with the amount being donated to charitable causes by commercial collectors.

We are proposing to:

- require a licence for collecting direct debit information house to house
 - to protect residents, particularly the vulnerable, from being exploited and from possible fraudulent requests for donations
- restrict house to house collections to 9:00am to 7:00pm no collections will be permitted where a "no cold calling" or similar notice is displayed
 - o to reduce the potential risk of nuisance
- allow only one house to house collection in any one council ward area on any given day
 - o to further prevent the risk of nuisance
- grant licences for a maximum of 14 days
 - o to give all charities equal opportunity

- allow charities one house to house licence per calendar quarter (January to March etc.)
 - o to give all charities equal opportunity
- require charities to submit a declaration confirming that they are satisfied with the amount being donated to charitable causes by commercial collectors
 - to avoid setting minimum amounts as the costs involved can vary substantially
- require applicants to provide evidence of public liability insurance for a minimum of £5 million
 - to cover compensation claims from third parties arising from injury and damage

Street collections

A permit is required to collect money or sell articles for charity in any street or public place (such as a shop doorway or car park).

We can decide whether to regulate street collections for charitable or other purposes.

We are proposing to:

- regulate street collections by adopting the Model Regulations (see draft policy appendix 3) the industry standard for street collections
 - to ensure openness, fairness and impartiality in determining applications
 - o to use industry standards for how we regulate:
 - an authorisation to collect
 - collector's behaviour
 - where collections can take place
 - correct use of collection boxes
 - collating donations
 - post collection auditing
- restrict street collections to 8:00am to 8:00pm
 - o to reduce the potential risk of nuisance
- limit street collections in any one location to one charity on any given day
 - to prevent nuisance to visitors and businesses
- restrict street collections to town and village centres

- to ensure that collections are visible and reduce any risk of public nuisance
- only allow one street collection permit per charity for one day, per calendar quarter (January to March etc.)
 - o to give all charities equal opportunity
- subject collectors proposing to use animals to additional checks including a requirement for specific risk assessments and insurance cover
 - o to check the welfare of animals use for street collection
- require charities to submit a declaration confirming that they are satisfied with the amount being donated to charitable causes by commercial collectors
 - to avoid setting minimum amounts as the costs involved can vary substantially
- require applicants provide evidence of public liability insurance for a minimum of £5 million
 - to cover compensation claims from third parties arising from injury and damage

Street collections: Site Management Agreements

A street collection permit does not cover the collection of direct debit information. Site Management Agreements (SMA) set controls on where and when this type of fundraising can take place.

SMAs are agreed between Buckinghamshire Council and the Chartered Institute of Fundraising (CloF).

We have Site Management Agreements in place for:

- Aylesbury town centre on Mondays and Tuesdays
- High Wycombe town centre on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays

We are proposing that street collection permits will not be issued for these locations on the same days as direct debit fundraising. As per existing SMAs, we are proposing to:

- only issue street collection permits for Aylesbury town centre on Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays
- only issue street collection permits for Wycombe town centre on Tuesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays

SMAs are not currently considered necessary for any other town centres in Buckinghamshire.
